HISTORY OF THE HOLOCAUST with Hans Wuerth, former German professor at Moravian College

For four Wednesday evenings beginning September 16, we will present lectures on National Socialism and the Holocaust, led by Hans Wuerth, who taught this material when he was a professor at Moravian College in Pennsylvania.

We will discuss the destructive political and social developments and events during National Socialism and their consequences, two of which are World War II and the Holocaust. We will also examine the planning, construction, layout, content and educational mission of the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum. It is hoped that these lectures might give everyone going to D.C. some helpful historical information on Hitler's dictatorship between 1933 and 1945 and its tragic results.

- September 16 Lecture 1: Introductory comments; Remembering the Holocaust after 1945: in Western Europe, in Germany, the United States and in Eastern Europe; The history of the Holocaust Memorial Museum, the permanent exhibition and educational center. Question and answer session.
- September 23 Lecture 2: (Hand-outs: The Third Reich. A chronological approach) Why the Weimar Republic failed, making the rise of Hitler possible; The ominous year 1933; Some other major and minor events before the beginning of World War II in 1939. Q & A.
- September 30 Lecture 3: World War II; The deadly persecution of European Jews; The various camps; the Resistance movements; The victims: European Jews and others; The Righteous Gentiles. Q & A.
- October 7 Lecture 4: "Never again?" From the Holocaust to other genocides since 1945: definition of genocide; Some examples: Cambodia – Rwanda – Darfur; Where do we go from here? Q & A.

This lecture series culminates in a trip to the Holocaust Museum on Friday, October 9 & Saturday, October 10. The trip is limited to 50 participants.
